An ice-cream stand is to be one of the attractions. An enjoyable afternoon may be expected.

We trust that, owing to this announcement, a goodly number of new subscribers will find their way to this office in the course of the coming week from those localities.

HON. D. McNEIL, of Port Hood, removes with his family to Halifax this week, where he will practice his profession hereafter. He has the best wishes of THE CASKET and of his many friends for his success in his new field. His brother, Mr. Alex. McNeil, the energetic junior member of the firm, continues the business at Port Hood.

THE BAND serenaded through the various streets of the Town Tuesday night, at the invitation of W. G. Cunningham, who kindly placed his re-modelled tally-ho, hauled by four horses, at their service. The coach which was made by Campbell Brothers of this town, has seen service on the route from the station, and judging from its present handsome appearance will render good service for some time to come.

SUPREME COURT DECISIONS. - Judge Ritchie filed decisions last week in Governors King's College vs. McInnis and Ryan vs. Terminal City Co. In the former case he decided that the defendant should hold that portion of the land which he had cleared twenty years before action was brought - viz., the half next the lake - and that plaintiffs should have judgment for the remainder, but without costs. In the latter case judgment was given for the plaintiff for the amount of the note sued upon, with interest and costs.

PRESENTATION. - Rev. Father Tompkins, of Guysboro, who, it will be remembered, was robbed of his watch by a burglar in October last, was presented by his parishioners with a beautiful gold watch on Saturday. The presentation was made by Thos. O'Neill, Esq., of Salmon River Lake, and Henry V. Condon, of Guysboro, on behalf of the contributors. On Sunday, Father Tompkins took occasion to thank the donors most heartily for their valuable gift.

THE FIREMEN, fourteen in all, who intend participating in the sports at Charlottetown on July 1st, started Tuesday morning, expecting to return home on Saturday. The contest they will enter is the hose-cart race, which consists of running 300 feet with the cart, attaching the hose to a hydrant, running out 200 feet of hose and coupling the branch pipe. Owing to many of the first members that comprised the team dropping off since the time they decided on going and new men with but very little chance to practice taken on in their places, it is too much to expect that they will capture a prize.

PIC-NICS, ETC. - The season for picnics, strawberry-festivals and bazaars is now upon us, and numerous opportunities are offered to spend a day patronizing one of these occasions. The ladies of the Presbyterian Church will hold a strawberry festival and sale in the rink building in town on next Tuesday. The parishioners of St. Patrick's Church, Lochaber, intend holding a grand strawberry festival on July 12th (see advertisement). The parishioners of the Catholic Church at Tracadie are arranging for a picnic to continue for two days - 13th and 14th prox. There will also be a picnic at St. Francis Harbor on July 20th.

PERSONAL. - Mr. Hugh P. McPherson, who has been studying theology at the Grand Seminary of Quebec for the last three years, returned home last Saturday. His many friends are glad to observe that he bears no outward traces of the hard study of the past year. He comes home a Licentiate in Theology, having recently passed with the highest distinction - as a letter we have since received from one of his professors informs us - a public examination for that degree. We understand that Mr. McPherson is to be promoted to the priesthood at Antigonish - his native parish - on the 15th of August next. Two other ecclesiastics - the Rev. Messrs. D. V. Phelan and A. L. McDonald will be ordained on the same day. Mr. McPherson will succeed the Rev. M. Coady as assistant to the Very Rev. Father Guinan, P. P., of Arichat.

SERIOUS RAILWAY ACCIDENT. - Brake man John Pushee of the freight train on this section of the I. C. R. met with a serious accident near Gerriers's platform on Wednesday morning. When last seen previous to the accident, he was leaning out of the steps of the rear passenger car. At Tracadie Station he was missed, and the train ran back in search of him. He was met walking along the track in a dazed condition and unable to tell what had happened to him. It is supposed that his head struck the framework of Black Bridge. The train hastened to Antigonish and Dr. Cameron summoned. A severe bruise on the back of the head was found, but the extent of the injury is not yet known. Last evening he was perfectly rational.

CEREBRAL APPOINTMENTS. - His Lordship Bishop Cameron has recently made a number of pastoral changes in the Diocese. The Rev. Joseph Chisholm has been transferred from Lakevale to Creignish, and the Rev. C. F. McKinnon from Creignish to Sydney Mines. The Rev. John N. McLeod has been removed from Thorburn to Desousses, and the Rev. A. J. Chisholm from Desousses to St. F. X. College. The Rev. Theophilus Richard is on the eve of removing from Canso to the mission at Fria's Head, and the Rev. Moses Coady, for the past year assistant to the Very Rev. James M. Quinan, of Arichat has succeeded Father McLeod in Thorburn. The vacancies at Lakevale and Canso will be filled in the course of a few weeks by the Rev. Alex. L. McDonald and the Rev. D. V. Phelan respectively. The Rev. Father Columbia, having been appointed Prior of the Tracadie Monastery, has resigned his charge of the Mission of Merland, which will henceforth be under the spiritual direction of the Rev. Michael Laffin, P. P., of Tracadie.

THE FEAST OF THE SACRED HEART, on Saturday last was celebrated in a most becoming manner at St. Ninian's Cathedral. A large number approached the sacraments that morning, and at 7.15 p. m. Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament was given. Never before was more exquisite taste shown in the decoration of the altar. The flowers and plants were beautiful and charmingly arranged. The work was done by the Sisters, and every one admired it. On Sunday morning upwards of two hundred children received Holy Communion, and at High Mass they were consecrated to the Sacred Heart. The procession of little girls that marched from the convent to the Cathedral, with their long-flowing white veils, was a beautiful sight. The ceremony of Consecration was begun by the recital of the Total Abstinence pledge by the children. With one voice the hundreds of children promised to abstain from all intoxicating drinks and to discourage the drinking habits of society. Many a heart must have been touched by that solemn promise, and many a prayer offered that it should never be broken. After the recital of the prayers of the consecration, the Rev. Father Gillis impressed upon the children the meaning of their consecration to the Sacred Heart and the virtues which, as children thus consecrated they should practice. He held up for the imitation of the boys and girls respectively, St. Aloysius Gonzaga and Blessed Margaret Mary, whose saintly childhood he dwelt eloquently upon. The singing of the beautiful Hymn to the Sacred Heart, in which the children arranged in the centre aisle joined with the choir, and which was rendered in an admirable manner that told of thorough training, completed the ceremony.

Georgeville Notes. Mr. John Gillis, Municipal Councillor for this district, left for a trip to Boston last week. The weather, considering the time of year, is somewhat cold, and consequently vegetation is less advanced than is usual at this season. Warm weather and timely showers would be welcome. Our esteemed pastor, Rev. D. Cameron, was busily engaged last week in preparing the children of the parish for their first Communion. Saturday, the 25th, being the Feast of the Sacred Heart, a large number of boys and girls received Holy Communion. Hake and cod are somewhat plentiful, but bait continues scarce. Lobster fishing is poor, and the factories will probably close in a short time. Mr. Alex. McPherson, of St. Joseph's College, Memramcook, N. B., is home at present visiting his many friends. We are all glad to see him in his usual good health and vigor. The marriage of Mr. Neil Melissac to Miss Christina Gillis took place at St. George's Church last Sunday. Rev. Father Cameron, P. P., officiated. We wish the newly-wedded couple a long and happy life.

Blue Rock breakwater, repairs, \$500.

McNair's Cove pier, heavy repairs, dredging, etc., \$5,000. Yarmouth harbor, \$10,000. Blanch harbor, \$300. Negro Island, beach protection, \$300. Grand Mang, \$5,000. Barrington Passage pier enlargement of pier, dredging, etc., revote, \$900. Mabou coal mines, wharf at Finlay point, the residents contributing in labor to the amount of two thousand dollars, \$2,000. Devil's island breakwater, \$1,100. Meagher's beach, repairs to protection work, \$500. Great Village wharf, \$240. Green Harbor, \$300. Louis Head, to complete breakwater, \$500. Port Lorne, to complete repairs to breakwater and extend east pier, \$500. Cow Bay, repairs to breakwater, \$2,500. To provide for expenses of survey of bed of straits between Capes, Forementine and Traverse, \$12,900. To provide for payment of 2 months' wages to father of R. McKenzie, who was drowned in September, 1888, at Cape Race, while acting as 2nd mate on steamer Newfield, \$90. To pay Macdonald Brothers for services in saving boiler and engine of Dominion steamer Napoleon III, wrecked at little Glace Bay, November, 1890, \$4,000. To provide compensation for damages to Ducau Chisholm's lands, county of Antigonish, through deprivations of Indians upon timber, \$400. Monument to Sir John Macdonald, \$10,000. To Mrs. Alex. MacKenzie, amount of Late Husband's indemnity, \$1,000. Steamship service, Pictou to Murray Harbor, Montague bridge and Souris tri-weekly, \$1,200. Additional I. C. R. accommodation at New Glasgow, \$6,000.
